Emergency Communications Organization is Reborn to Save Lives Reduce Suffering

Aurora, MN May 18, 2010 -- We are pleased to announce that The North American Center for Emergency Communications, Inc. (NACEC) has been reborn. NACEC, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, provides emergency communications into large-scale disaster areas where communications system are often severely damaged or destroyed. Since it was founded in 1992 NACEC has directly or indirectly assisted more than 929,000 disaster victims.

The United Nations puts the need for emergency communications like this:

"When disaster strikes, the immediate needs are obvious: food, water, shelter, and medical supplies. But none of these necessities will reach survivors without the largely invisible communication networks that must be set up quickly to enable relief workers to save lives."

This may not seem that important as you read this, but what if the disaster occurred in your area, directly effecting your family members. I am sure that you would do everything in your power to make sure that your family received the food, water, shelter and medical attention they needed, as quickly as possible. I am also sure that you would not be willing to wait days, a week or several weeks for aid to reach your family.

When a large-scale disaster occurs within the U.S. or Internationally NACEC will deploy a team of professional communications staff equipped with commercial communications systems that will provide additional, if not the only available, two-way radio, high-speed Internet and long

distance telephone communications capability that responding organizations need to quickly coordinate, manage and safely conduct their life saving relief operations. When fully operational our response teams of just five staff members will be able to provide communications to 100's of locations and individuals within a disaster area.

There is a tremendous amount of work being done in an attempt to get NACEC fully operational by the end of October 2010. NACEC's founder, Edward Addy, is not a stranger to accomplishing the development of large projects on very compressed timetables. In 1990, with the help of 47 companies and nearly 300 volunteers he put together the Desert Voices Project's communications center near Farmington, MN which provided radio-telephone service between U.S. forces serving in operation Desert Storm/Shield and their families back home here in the U.S. He managed to get one of the most powerful radio communications centers in the U.S. designed, built and operational in just 45 days, making it ready for use in time for the Christmas season.

It is his goal to give the new NACEC to assist as many disaster victims each year, as it did in all of its previous years of service combined. The need is there, we just need to have the ability and the desire to make the service available to save lives and reduce the suffering of the millions who find themselves unwilling victims of large-scale disasters each year.
